Registration Fee and a portion was donated by Welcome to Taipei.

I would like to announce that Faye Fang has accepted to serve on the WCI Executive Committee as Vice-Chair-Far East. She will be a great addition to our Committee and we look forward to working with her.

The principle of Friendship and Understanding was further strengthened at the Conference. Our sisters in Taipei gave a new meaning to the word friendship.

Our Charter Club, Welcome to Washington, will hold the next Biennial Conference in May 2004 in Washington D.C.

Men as Associate Members?

Marian Adair, founder of WCl, also founded an International Men's Club in Florida. In conclusion, the ladies would like to have men as guests at dinner and cocktail parties, but not as members.

What do you as members look for in a WCI Conference?

Members looked for direct inter-club link and meeting people world wide, opportunities to exchange ideas, graciousness and different styles of hospitality. They appreciated having local members on tours with them to add more insight into their country.

How would you like to see WCI become more involved in world affairs?

Members were not interested in getting involved with political or religious issues. They preferred culture and friendship.

How do you think WCI can be promoted more locally and globally?

Members were cautious about promoting WCI in newspapers as it could attract into the club people who have wrong motives for joining. Promotion through international schools, consulates, embassies or through personal contacts would be favored.

REVISITING OUR PAST

Ed.note - Robert Nadeau is the husband of Mary Lou Nadeau, Past-President of Welcome to Florida and founder of that club. He is also a member of the International Men's Club of Florida. This article honors the many husbands of WCI members who served so gallantly in that war.



June 6, 1944 found the allied forces of the United States, Great Britain and Canada proceeding with the invasion of the Normandy Coast of France. That first day, 175,000 allied soldiers and sailors under the command of General Dwight D. Eisenhower, landed on the beaches of Normandy. The skies were crowded with 11,000 aircraft and the seas were filled with nearly 5000 ships of all kinds from the smallest troop landing craft to the mighty battleships. As a

young Navy Corpsman aboard LST 58, I found myself around 6AM (H hour) headed for Utah Beach with 30 Sherman Tanks and troops ready to be in the first wave of American soldiers on the beaches of France. Fortunately Utah Beach had been heavily shelled by the Naval ships even as we proceeded towards the beach, firing over landing craft. Even though we took considerable enemy fire in the landing that morning, it was far better than Omaha Beach that nearly became a total disaster. On Utah Beach after placing our troops and tanks ashore, LST 58 quickly converted to an evacuation ship, complete with a small operating room. History has recorded that over 35,000 killed and wounded were evacuated back to England that first day...

June 26, 2001 found myself back on Utah Beach along with my wife Mary Lou and the President of Hillsdale College in Michigan. While in France we toured Paris with a World War II guide. College Professors lectured at all five Normandy invasion beaches and we went on an afternoon walk on the famous beach at Dunkirk. To walk among the over 9280 crosses made one realize the great price paid by the Americans to liberate Europe. We also visited the German cemetery at La Cambe, France where some 24,000 young Germans lay buried.

We then went to London where we enjoyed a walking tour with Churchill's official biographer, Sir Martin Gilbert. We were privileged to have a tour of Parliament with lecturing guides in the Houses. We visited Churchill's home, Chartwell and then dined at Grosvenor House with former Prime Minister Lady Margaret Thatcher and Sir Denis. We had ten days of wonderful remembrances among the historic sites which were important to the liberation of Europe.
